## JUDICIAL INDEPENDENCE

The idea is simple:

The judiciary must be separate from the other branches of government.

Judges must not be subject to improper influence from the other branches of government, or from private or partisan interests.





# CHARACTERISTICS OF AN INDEPENDENT JUDICIARY

A truly independent judiciary has three characteristics.

- First, impartiality. Judges should consider each case with an open mind, rendering an unbiased judgment.
- Second, a "reputation for impartiality and nonpartisanship," as recommended in the 1989 decision by the Supreme Court, Mistretta v. United States.
- Third, freedom from outside interference.








# PERSONAL THREATS AND ASSAULTS

- Last five years, threats to federal judges increased 400%.
- More than 4,500 threats against federal judges during 2021.
- Example: Judge Esther Salas
- Increase in state courthouse violence
- Personal safety issues of judges and staff



## LEGISLATIVE ACTIONS TO IMPACT THE ROLE OR INDEPENDENCE OF THE COURTS

- In 2022, state lawmakers in 25 states nationwide considered over 70 bills that would politicize or undermine the independence of the state courts:
- At least 5 bills became law in 3 states

### NEW HISTORIC LOW



The Gallup Poll released on June 23, 2022 reported public trust and confidence in the United States Supreme Court has dropped sharply reaching a new historic low.

• Only 25% of Americans have confidence in Supreme Court, down from 36% in 2021





## MONEY POURS INTO STATE JUDICIAL ELECTIONS

- In 38 states, supreme court judges must stand for election. These elections take various forms partisan, nonpartisan, or uncontested retention elections, in which citizens vote simply to keep or remove a judge.
- In recent elections unprecedented amounts of money have poured into these campaigns. The 2019-2020 election cycle set a record for spending on state justice elections, with \$97 million spent on the races nationwide, according to a Brennan Center **report**.

### TRUST AND CONFIDENCE



- Courts rely upon public trust and confidence to uphold the rule of law in our society.
- Declines in public trust and confidence at the United States Supreme Court level may also have a trickle-down effect on other jurisdictions including state courts.
- Public perceptions of bias, including political bias in judicial decision-making.



# WHY DOES JUDICIAL INDEPENDENCE MATTER?

- Do people trust the judiciary will make decisions based on the law?
- Will people comply with court decisions even if they disagree with those decisions?





### OUTCOMES

People comply because there are consequences but also because they believe in the rule of law and the fair disposition of those consequences.

• If people lose respect...less likely to seek help of the courts or comply with dictates of the courts.

## WHAT WE KNOW.....

• Knowledge of the courts drives support for an independent judiciary. As found in prior research on the courts, building long-term public support for an independent judiciary will require the public to become better informed about the courts.

 Surveys show that those Americans with the most knowledge of the ways the courts function tend to be among the most likely to reject attempts to reduce the courts' powers.

#### North Carolina Code of Judicial Conduct

Canon 2 A judge should avoid impropriety in all the judge's activities.
