Judge Rick's Perspective

Simply put, the justice gap is the difference between the legal needs of low-income and moderateincome people (and small businesses) and the resources available to meet those needs. Nearly 10 million rural residents are eligible for Legal Services Corporation services (2017 LSC Justice Gap Report)



75% of rural households experienced a civil legal problem in prior year

23% of them experienced more than SIX civil legal problems

REMEMBER: Low-income rural residents receive inadequate or no professional legal help for an estimated 86% of their problems



In the US, 40% of all counties have fewer than 1 lawyer per 1,000 residents

In ten states with large rural populations, there counties with no lawyers

REMEMBER: 20% of US population lives in rural communities, yet only 2% of lawyers serve those communities



One-third of rural counties had poverty rates above 20%

For single mothers with children, the rural poverty rate is 44%

REMEMBER: All of these statistics are from before COVID



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


