

EMERGING THREATS AND HOW TO STAY SAFE

The United States Marshals Service's Judicial Security Division (JSD) is committed to the protection of the judicial process by ensuring the safe and secure conduct of judicial proceedings, and protecting federal judges, jurors, and other members of the federal judiciary.

Judicial figures will likely experience a heightened threat environment as federal and state courts hear divisive cases relating to the 2024 general election and other sociopolitical issues linked to grievances that have motivated some domestic violent extremists to violence.





THE EVOLVING THREAT LANDSCAPE

Contributing Factors:

- Increased volume of federal cases
- High profile terrorism/gang cases
- Climate of civil unrest
- Lack of mental health assistance nationwide
- Contraband cell phones in prisons
- Technological advancements
- Information easily located
- Online maps
- Dark web

WORKPLACE SECURITY

- Attend and offer security training for your staff
- Identify and report Activities of Concern
- Understand the importance of communication with law enforcement
- Develop awareness and a plan with your staff
- Do not allow unauthorized people into your chambers
- Know where duress buttons are located and how to use them



Any contact from a subject that goes beyond the normal course of business, it can be a letter, a phone call, an email, or a personal meeting.

- A threat does not necessarily mean danger.
- The lack of a threat does not necessarily mean safety.

Self-Serve Judicial Security

Stay Alert and Affirmatively Aware Be Mindful of Your Surroundings

Environment

- Evaluate your surroundings
- Detail your movement
- Start to list out the points where information goes out and comes in
- Understand your family's needs and movements
- These are the points that potential threats can exploit

Trust Your Instincts

- Is there contact from a person that is out of the ordinary
 - Litigant reaching out to an email address or phone number that they shouldn't have
 - Someone is overly aggressive or intense in awkward situations
 - Receiving persistent letters that are outside the normal course of business
 - Personal contact (or near-contact) in an out-of-place setting (grocery store, school event, neighborhood walks)

Types of Contact

- In-Person
- US Mail or Deliveries
- Verbal
- Email
- Telephonic
- Signaling
- Proxy

Safeguards at Home

- Cut back shrubbery so they aren't blocking the view to the street
- Put good locks on all doors AND windows
- Put up additional exterior lighting and a peephole
- Use remote access "doorbell" and camera (eg. Nest)
- Display "Guard Dog" or "Security Alarm Service" signs
- Or, you know, actually buy adopt a dog

Safeguards in Transit

- Vacation plans are on a Need To Know basis
- Have an alternate route between work and home and USE it
- Know where the police/fire/security stations are
- Avoid chokepoints (especially on local routes), if possible
- Never get in bumper to bumper traffic
- Give yourself enough space to get away
- Be aggressive (I mean don't get arrested or cause road rage)
- Avoid parking in assigned spots
- Don't advertise your parking space

Safeguards at Work

- Lock your doors
- Do not allow anyone into chambers that isn't authorized
 - Staff
 - Family
 - Friends
 - Legal Counsel, on appointment
- LISTEN to the security professionals
 - Just because you don't like it, doesn't mean they are wrong
- Take protective measures and know how to use "panic buttons"

Packages and Mail

- Regularly communicate with family what is expected to be deliverd
- Look for packages with excessive postage
- Does the return address match the postmark
- Familiar with the sender without grammatical errors
- Look for damaged packaging, like oily spots, protruding wires, unwrapped sharp edges
- Consider a Post Office Box or virtual address
- Consider the court or agency as a mailing address (if allowed)

Proper Mindset

- Recognize that threats exists
- Apathy, denial, complacency will get you hurt
 - Worse it will get a loved one hurt and that's a guilt that doesn't shake off
- Take responsibility for your safety
- Police, Sheriff, Courtroom security can NOT be everywhere
- Communicate with loved ones about plans, location, guests
- Be vigilant
- Communicate your concerns to your security

Social Media

Social Media

- The very nature of social media is communicating a chosen version of yourself to as broad an audience as possible
- Assume that nothing is private
- Know that anything that goes into the internet never goes away
- Don't get adventurous
- Political statements are dangerous and toxic
- Sane people don't win arguments on the Internet
- Resist leaving reviews on products or services

Be Careful, Consistent, and Conscious

- Be discreet about personal information
- Delete emails and text with personal information as soon as read
- Screen lock your computer when you leave (Windows Key + L)
- Turn devices off (Power them down) more often
- Talk with your family (the chill'uns) about posting information
- Screen posted pictures for background information
- Avoid allowing devices to use geolocation; or
- Remove GPS apps from memory when you finish using it
- HESITATE before pressing the 'Send' key

Not Your Fault

- H Hear them out. Listen to why they are so upset. Let them tell their story.
- E Empathize. Let them know that you understand why they feel angry and threatened.
- A Ask questions. Show interest in them. Affirm your interest and understanding of their feelings.
- R Respond in a way that is calming. An angry or overly authoritative response makes matters worse.
- T Thank them for sharing their story with you. Thank them for regaining control of their emotions.

Don't Be Afraid to Discuss Your Concerns

- Trust your instincts
- Try to be aware of your environment
- Tell Law Enforcement you trust
- Talk to Court Staff and Family/Friends
- Try not to be alone

judge" during intake (09/01/2024). Doe was released from TCSO custody on 09/03/2024.

Doe is a mental health consumer but denies having mental health and refuses to take his medications. Doe has recently uploaded concerning posts on his Facebook page. One of which refers to his father.

Doe is currently clear of warrants. He does have an expired TX DL and bond conditions.

Bond Conditions are as follows: MH SUPERV; NO THREATENING/HARASSING CONTACT W/PARENTS; NO FIREARMS/DANGEROUS WEAPONS; MH EVAL WITHIN 72 HOURS.

Doe has a court hearing set for Sept. 13, 2025, with County Court 9 (0830 Hours) Cause #'s C-1-CR-00-000000 and C-1-CR-11-111111
